## **NST Part III History and Philosophy of Science** Set essays

Answer any two questions. Answers should not exceed 2,500 words each.

- 1. "The idea of extinction is a product of colonialism." What historical evidence can you offer to support or refute this claim?
- 2. What does it mean for an organism to be identified as "intelligent"?
- 3. "There is a fundamental difference between whether a claim *is* established and whether we *ought* to say it." Does this mean we don't need to worry about inductive risk?
- 4. Did imperial interests help or hinder the use of nineteenth-century astronomical instruments?
- 5. What, if anything, can history tell us about the concept of race?
- 6. Is modern science monist? In which ways, and to what extent?
- 7. "The present pandemic shows all too clearly that diseases do not map on to neat narratives." Discuss.
- 8. Choose a particular feature of our sexuality. Is this feature best understood with an evolutionary account, or an alternative account?
- 9. "Randomised Controlled Trials are the gold standard of evidence for causal claims." Discuss.
- 10. By analogy to the geographic sensitivity that Mahony and Hulme recommend, how might a sensitivity to *temporality* enrich our understanding of climate knowledge politics?
- 11. "As an accomplice to contemporary imperialism, public health manages (as a profession) and maintains (as an academic discipline) global health inequity." Does the history of international and global health support this statement?
- 12. "A scientific instrument is an instrument used by scientists." Discuss.
- 13. "The direction of time is a basic feature of our experience of the world, so it is unreasonable to reject its existence." Discuss.
